
## April Encounters Reveal President Trump's First 100 Days of Secure Borders

APRIL FY2025 SWB ENCOUNTERS 12.035

- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) recorded just 29,238 encounters nationwide in April, including 12,035 at the Southwest border. Nationwide border encounters in April decreased by 88% compared to April 2024, and Southwest border encounters dropped 93% compared to April 2024.
- U.S. Border Patrol (USBP) apprehensions between ports of entry at the Southwest border last month (8,383) decreased by 93% compared to April 2024 (128,895) and 95% compared to April 2023 (183,921), at the height of the Biden border crisis.
- USBP averaged roughly 279 apprehensions per day on the Southwest border in April, a 93% drop from the daily average in April 2024 (4,297).
- CBP encounters of inadmissible aliens at the Northern border dropped by 71% in April 2025 (4,835) compared to April 2024 (16,848).
- Last month also marked a 94% decrease in USBP apprehensions along the busiest sector of the Northern border, the Swanton Sector, (89) compared to April 2024 (1,470).
- After President Trump ended Biden's unlawful mass-parole schemes, encounters at ports of entry nationwide dropped 83% in April compared to April 2024.
- Encounters of unaccompanied alien children (UAC) at the SWB dropped by 90% last month compared to April 2024.
- Encounters of family unit individuals at our borders nationwide were down 97% in April (1,840) compared to April 2024 (78,668).
- In the first 100 days of the Trump administration, Immigration and Customs Enforcement arrested 66,463 illegal aliens and removed 65,682 aliens.





## Homeland Republicans Are Working to Fund President Trump's Border Victory for Years to Come



- An April poll revealed 55% of all respondents approved of President Trump's performance on border security.
- In order to continue President Trump's success at our borders, last month, Homeland Republicans advanced recommendations that would amount to one of the largest investments in border security ever considered by Congress.
- We advanced \$46 billion for the border barrier system, specifically:
  - 701 miles of primary wall
  - 900 miles of river barriers & 629 miles of secondary barriers
  - 141 miles of vehicle and pedestrian barriers
- With catch-and-release down 99.9% at the Southwest border, our Border Patrol agents can go back to doing the jobs they were hired to do. In a statement on last month's border encounter data, Pete Flores, Acting Commissioner of CBP, said it best: "For the first time in years, more agents are back in the field—patrolling territories that CBP didn't have the bandwidth or manpower to oversee just six months ago."
- To continue addressing force morale after years of a historic crisis, Homeland Republicans advanced more than \$7 billion in funding last month to increase CBP personnel, training, and incentives. We would fund: 3,000 new USBP agents, 5,000 new customs officers, 200 new AMO agents, 290 support staff, and eligible retired agents and officers.
- While drug seizures at our borders nationwide have increased 30% compared to last April, fentanyl seizures have dropped dramatically.
- With the Southwest border re-secured between ports of entry, cartels are being forced to work harder than ever before to find ways to line their pockets. Over numerous days and across five states in April, the Department of Justice reported the largest fentanyl bust in Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) history, disrupting Sinaloa Cartel smuggling.
- This is why Homeland Republicans are pushing to invest more than \$5 billion in enhancing technology at and between ports of entry, so law enforcement can stop this poison from ever reaching our streets.
